


Development policy outcomes of the 2015 G7 Summit at Schloss Elmau  
**A strong signal for development policy**

**Climate action** Assisting people in places where climate change is stalling development



The G7 aims to ensure that **up to 400m more people** in developing countries **will be insured against climate risks by 2020**.



The G7 and the African Union want to increase Africa's generating capacity for renewable energy to **10 gigawatts by 2020** – the equivalent of 10 large coal-fired power stations.



The G7 is committed to the climate financing target of **100 billion US dollars** a year from 2020 onwards.



Development policy is at the centre of many of the decisions negotiated at Elmau under Germany's Presidency. The G7 aims to create positive momentum for the key UN conferences taking place in 2015 – on financing for development, on sustainable development and

on a new climate agreement. The G7 is committed to the goal of achieving an ambitious post-2015 agenda for sustainable development and has reaffirmed its intention of working towards making 0.7% of gross national income available for official development assistance.



**Food security and nutrition**  
A world without hunger is possible

The G7, working in cooperation with its partners, aims to lift 500 million people out of hunger and malnutrition by 2030. A separate annex outlines ways to achieve this goal.

**Standards in supply chains**  
For decent work worldwide



For the first time, fair working and environmental conditions in supply chains – e.g. in the garment industry – are on the G7 agenda. The fair conditions are to be fostered through various measures, including



**Strong alliances** within G7 countries, similar to the one initiated by the BMZ for sustainable textiles.



**More transparency for consumers.**



**Support for countries where production takes place**, including through the establishment of a Fund to prevent workplace-related accidents.

**Health**  
Strengthening health systems



The G7 **supports** the strengthening of **health systems across the globe**. The G7 is offering to assist at least 60 developing countries to help prevent future epidemics.



More, and more efficient, research is to be carried out into neglected **tropical diseases**.



**Financing mechanisms are to be established and mobile teams** set up for rapid deployment in emergency situations such as the Ebola crisis.



**300m children**

New funding for the global vaccination alliance Gavi will enable **more than 300 million children worldwide to be vaccinated** over the next few years.



**Women and girls**  
Promoting the economic empowerment of women

**The number of women and girls** technically and vocationally educated and trained in developing countries through G7 measures **will be increased by one third by 2030**.



The G7 will support the efforts of its partners in developing countries to **overcome the legal and social barriers that prevent women from actively participating in economic life**.

Other decisions and processes



The G7 **reconfirms the Deauville Partnership** and with it its commitment to the people of the Middle East and North Africa.



The G7 is committed to **holding itself accountable through regular reporting**. The Elmau Progress Report on G7's biodiversity commitment was published in June 2015.



The **CONNEX initiative** to advise resource-rich developing countries on negotiating agreements in the extractives sector will be further developed.



**Dialogue with Africa:** On the second day of the summit, partners had the opportunity to contribute to the summit discussions.



**Involving civil society:** The Federal Government engages in regular exchanges with non-governmental organisations on topics relating to the G7/G8 and G20.
