

Transitional development assistance




Many countries around the world are affected by persistent or recurring crises. The transitional development assistance provided by the BMZ strengthens the resilience of the hardest-hit people and local structures. As an instrument of crisis management, it bridges the

gap between acute humanitarian assistance, longterm development cooperation and peacebuilding. Transitional development assistance supports people and institutions to manage and prevent crises on their own.



Iraq is affected by overlapping crises. Attacks of the IS, poor prospects for youth and insufficient water, electricity and education along with societal tensions contribute to continued insecurity. For the 4.9 million internally displaced people who have already returned, living conditions are precarious. As a result, up

to 1.2 million people are still hesitant to return to their home areas. The Covid-19 pandemic severely affected the economy of the country. Iraq has since been slow to recover from the economic crisis. Transitional development assistance focuses on physical and social reconstruction and strengthens social cohesion in the country. It strengthens people' resilience and local structures. The portfolio comprises 40 ongoing projects with a total budget of around €703 million. Geographically, the work particularly focuses on the provinces of Ninewa and Anbar.



Linking humanitarian assistance and development

Since 2019, the Federal Foreign Office and the BMZ have been integrating humanitarian assistance with transitional development assistance in a so-called nexus project. It aims to improve livelihoods for the local population and prevent a resurgence of violent conflict. In Ninewa, Deutsche Welthungerhilfe is rehabilitating sanitation and hygiene facilities and is improving access to drinking water along with long-term reconstruction. With BMZ funds, GIZ rehabilitates agricultural land in a resourcefriendly way and the population is being trained to cultivate it. In this way, Deutsche Welthungerhilfe covers immediate needs of the returnees and the host communities while also creating economic prospects. With the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic, a new hospital ward was built in Sinjar and local authorities were supported in infection control

Social reconstruction

GIZ provides comprehensive support to the population in Ninewa by promoting the local economy, strengthening social cohesion and rebuilding public infrastructure. In particular, returnees, women and young people receive temporary cash for their work, as well as education and training in order to find longterm employment. In addition, GIZ strengthens the capacities of the population for peaceful conflict management and supports the negotiation of local peace agreements. The communities themselves decide which infrastructure is going to be rebuilt. The construction of a new road, for example, enables people to return home and thus promotes peaceful and inclusive communities.

Rebuilding infrastructure

Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) and German Development Bank KfW are supporting the population in reestablishing agricultural production and trade structures. In doing so, they are particularly improving the livelihoods of internally displaced persons and Iraqi refugees who have returned to the devastated communities of Anbar and Salah-Al Din. In addition, support is provided to people who were not displaced during the armed conflict yet are struggling as they rebuild their lives. NRC provides affected farmers with access to supplies and equipment and supports them with education and training. In order to further boost employment, NRC also supports business start-ups in the agricultural sector.
