

Transitional development assistance



Many countries around the world are affected by persistent or recurring crises. The transitional development assistance provided by BMZ strengthens the resilience of the hardest-hit people and local structures. As an instrument of crisis management,

it bridges the gap between humanitarian assistance, long-term development cooperation and peacebuilding. Transitional development assistance supports people and institutions to manage and prevent crises on their own.

TRANSITIONAL DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE

The Palestinian-Israeli conflict, which continues to flare up, is one of the longest unresolved conflicts in the world. The ongoing violence and the consequences of the Covid-19 pandemic have left twothirds of residents of the Gaza Strip dependent on humanitarian assistance; in the West Bank, it is one in five. Particularly in the Gaza Strip, the living conditions of the people are deteriorating increasingly: For more than fifteen years, the movement of people and goods in and out of the Gaza Strip has been restricted. The economic situation and the ongoing

violence have had a serious impact on the physical and mental health of the population and demolished basic services. Transitional development assistance strengthens peoples' resilience to crises and disasters. The engagement focuses primarily on the reconstruction of essential infrastructure and services. This allows the population an improved access to health care, water and sanitation in the territories. Further training and employment opportunities are promoted to improve prospects for the population.

Particular attention is paid to the needs of women, children and young people as well as people with disabilities.

BMZ's transitional development assistance portfolio comprises 13 ongoing projects with a total budget of over EUR 244 million.

Conflict

Securing the supply of clean water

In the **Gaza Strip**, the **GIZ** supplies public water, sanitation, education and health facilities with renewable energy. In this way, local communities become more independent of the limited energy supply and regain access to vital services. Young people are also trained in this field and encouraged to develop innovative and sustainable ideas. With their newly acquired expertise, they can develop sustainable green technologies and the infrastructure for them. In addition, vocational training centers are being built and rehabilitated, and the staff is being trained in energy efficiency, maintenance of facilities and improvement of

ciency, maintenance of facilities and improvement of water quality. The measures of the project benefit almost half of the population of the Gaza Strip.

Protecting girls and women against violence

Women and girls are particularly affected by the situation in the Gaza Strip. If they live with a disability, they often experience even higher levels of discrimination and exclusion. The NGO Christoffel Blindenmission (CBM) provides inclusive support to help them cope better with the psychological stress caused by the ongoing conflict. Women who have experienced violence are provided with psychological support to process and cope with these traumas. In addition, the range of medical treatments and mobility equipment is expanded by the NGO. In



order to reduce violence in the long term, structures for the protection of women are being expanded: the NGO directly involves leaders in the community and conducts education in schools. CBM also supports impoverished women in regards to education, job search and the development of business models to enable them to have a more secure future with prospects.



Promoting sustainable reconstruction

The increased pressure on the infrastructure has led to the water supply in the Gaza Strip to become extremely critical. The United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East (UNRWA) and KfW Development Bank are improving the devastating situation in the water sector by treating wastewater and desalinating seawater. In order to secure the supply of this treated water for the population, water pipes and networks have been maintained and extended, and protective measures against frequent flooding are expanded. This work is undertaken by the population which creates job and income opportunities. The improved water and sanitation supplies as well as hygiene conditions in the camps for Palestinian refugees also lead to a reduction in health risks that arise, for example, from contaminated water.

Since UNRWA's activities are directed exclusively at Palestinian refugees, they are complemented by the **United Nations Office for Project Services (UNOPS)**, which, for example is rebuilding housing.

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
